

## Hillsboro City Council Appoints Rick Van Beveren



The Hillsboro City Council voted unanimously on October 20 to appoint Rick Van Beveren to represent Ward 1 on the Council. Mayor Jerry Willey recommended Van Beveren to fill the Council seat formerly held by Megan Braze, who resigned in August to purchase a home outside of Hillsboro.

Van Beveren is the president of Reedville Café and Reedville Catering, and is a principal in a local property development and management company. He has served as president of the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce, the TriMet Board of Directors, the Hillsboro Community Foundation, and the Vision Action Network of Washington County.

"I'm honored the Mayor recommended me and the Council selected me," Van Beveren said. "I'm honored to serve, and I am looking forward to learning more about the opportunities in the city and the challenges that our community may face going forward."

Van Beveren has served as an advisory board member of the Hillsboro Schools Foundation, a member of the Hillsboro 2020 Vision Implementation Committee, a board member of the Portland Rose Festival Association, and a board member of the Oregon International Air Show. His Council term will run until January 2017. He is eligible to run for election in November 2016.

## MAYOR'S MESSAGE

### We're Moving Forward with Revitalizing Downtown Hillsboro

After six years of public discussion about the one-way street grid in Downtown Hillsboro – including four community open houses, nearly a dozen public meetings, a website, and more – two-way street conversion supporters, like myself, felt we had addressed any lingering questions. Still, our City Council remained divided on the matter. That's why I wrote a letter to the community in late September asking our Council to re-evaluate the street conversion project. I wanted our City Council to either agree with consensus to move forward, or agree to shelve the project. At the end of the day, the Council agreed unanimously that we don't need a well-intentioned traffic change to become a major point of division for our community. The Council recognized that we have too many exciting projects and opportunities right now to get bogged down. As a result, the street grid in Downtown Hillsboro will remain one-way. What won't change, however, is our commitment to Downtown Hillsboro.

## CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

### Our Libraries Serve Us As Modern Community Centers

What is it about going to the library that puts you in a better mood the minute you walk through the door? It could be the endless opportunities to learn, or the direct access to books and materials you never knew existed. Perhaps it's the fact that so many familiar faces can be spotted inside during library hours.

Increasingly, the Hillsboro Public Library is providing new reasons to visit the Main Library on Brookwood Parkway, or the Shute Park Branch Library on SE 10th Avenue. From concerts for kids, lectures for adults, and movies for everyone, more and more the library serves as a community center where we gather together to share experiences and to learn.

In the past, we thought of libraries as centers for storing and borrowing books, with a few quiet areas for reading. Now, our libraries are capable of hosting large crowds or small groups. In January, the Library will host the Mayor's State of the City Address, where more than 300 people will gather to hear Mayor Willey review the City's accomplishments from the past year, and goals for the future. In the days before and after the event, the Main Library is likely to host a class for families who want to learn a craft, a discussion of science, or an accomplished storyteller.

A quick scan of the City Views calendar on pages 11 and 12, includes library screenings of well-known movies, such as: *Jurassic World*; *Avengers: Age of Ultron*; *Minions*; and, (my personal favorite) *The SpongeBob Movie: Sponge Out of Water*.

You can reserve a study room or meeting room at the Library to close a business deal, work as a group on a collaborative project, or have a confidential conversation. These



rooms clearly serve an important role: study rooms are occupied 97 percent of the time and, during regular library hours, meeting rooms are occupied nearly 80 percent of the time. Companies such as Intel and FEI, and nonprofits such as the Red Cross, and the Hillsboro School District are among the groups that use meeting space at the Hillsboro Public Library.

Look around the inside of the library and you will see local artists' work on display, bringing

our community closer together in appreciation of creativity. Take a peek inside a computer lab and you will see why libraries play an important role in bridging the digital divide for households without an Internet connection.

Even outside the library walls, you will find library programming bringing people together. The Library on the Loose mobile library takes reading opportunities to schools, neighborhoods, and community events. Events such as Hillsboro Reads, the month-long celebration of reading, extend out into bookstores, restaurants, and other places.

The result of this diverse library programming is more opportunities to run into neighbor and friends, and make new friends with each visit.

# North Hillsboro Industrial Renewal Plan Public Outreach Continues



The proposed North Hillsboro Industrial Renewal Area is north of Evergreen Road and south of U.S. 26.

The proposed North Hillsboro Industrial Area represents one of the few significant development opportunities for industrial sites in the Portland area to meet the region’s needs and the public’s vision for job creation and economic growth over the next 25 years. To achieve this vision, North Hillsboro requires a full complement of public infrastructure, trail and public access, and natural resource enhancements – none of which exist today.

The Hillsboro City Council has scheduled a public hearing for Tuesday, November 17, to consider adopting the North Hillsboro Industrial Renewal Plan. The Plan aims to provide adequate and safe public infrastructure, open space, and trail facilities that will support economic development in the North Hillsboro Industrial Area by sustaining and growing job opportunities.


In September: every City resident and business received notice of the Plan inside the City Views newsletter; City of Hillsboro employees held the third community open house meeting to gather public input; the Hillsboro Economic Development Council proposed the Plan to the City Council for adoption; and, the Hillsboro Planning Commission held a public hearing wherein commissioners determined the Plan complies with Hillsboro’s Comprehensive Plan goals and policies.

Regional land-use policy – requiring larger sites for single, industrial users – makes traditional, developer-financed infrastructure unlikely. An Industrial Renewal Plan allows tax-increment financing as a funding source to address implementation challenges, and to achieve City and regional goals. ## Leaf Pick-up Program Returns

The City of Hillsboro’s annual curbside street tree leaf pick-up program helps keep streets clean and reduces flooding caused by clogged storm drains. To help us better serve you, please rake loose street tree leaves into a windrow, 18 inches away from the curb to allow storm water to drain. Keep leaf windrows less than three feet high and do not block mailboxes, driveways, garbage collection, intersections, or cul-de-sacs. If you miss your leaf pick-up date, you can bring your leaves to the City’s leaf disposal location – the Fairground Sports Complex on 28th Ave, next to the tennis courts – on three dates: November 7, November 21, or December 12, from 9:30 am - 3:30 pm.

## Air Quality: Burning Restrictions Begin November 20

Working to improve air quality, the Hillsboro City Council unanimously approved a new wood-smoke curtailment policy in order to reduce air emissions of fine particulates called PM 2.5, which can pose serious health concerns. The new policy applies to fireplaces, wood stoves, and wood-stove inserts during poor-air periods, and the outdoor burning of wood and yard debris.

### OUTDOOR BURNING

Beginning November 20, the City of Hillsboro prohibits burning yard debris on residential properties at all times, year round. The ban on yard debris burning does not apply to recreational fires such as backyard fire pits, chimineas, or barbecues.

### INDOOR BURNING

The new policy also establishes a daily color-coded air quality advisory between November 1 and March 1. Indoor burning is not restricted between March 2 and October 31, and the policy does not restrict the use of pellet stoves.

**RED:** Air quality is unhealthy. No fireplace or wood stove use, unless exempted.\*

**YELLOW:** Air quality is unhealthy for sensitive groups. Voluntary limitations on fireplace and wood stove use.

**GREEN:** Air quality is healthy. No restrictions.

\*Exempted from the indoor burning policy are:

- Households that rely on wood burning as the only available heat source
- Households with longer interruptions to their primary heating system (no more than 60 days)
- Households experiencing an interruption in utility service (electricity and natural gas)
- Households that qualify as low-income

### Construction Underway on Hillsboro Public Works Facility

Construction activity on the new Hillsboro Public Works Facility is ramping up at the corner of NW Evergreen Road and NW Sewell Road. The project is expected to be completed by the end of 2016.




An artist's rendering of the future Hillsboro Public Works Facility.

Situated on 15 acres on the northern side of the City's service area, the new two-story facility will replace existing Public Works Department facilities near Downtown Hillsboro. Locating Public Works Department employees in one location will create operating efficiencies and cost savings. The initial construction phase of the new facility will include approximately 51,600 square feet of buildings for Public Works Operations. In addition, the facility will have approximately 8,500 square feet of Public Works Fleet shops to maintain City vehicles and equipment.



# Getting Ready for “The Big One”



## How Hillsboro is Preparing for a Major Earthquake

Disaster can strike at any time and without warning. Scientists point to the increasing possibility of a major earthquake in the Cascadia Subduction Zone as a concern. Recent media attention has brought a heightened awareness of the need to prepare, now, so that you and your family can be ready for such an event.

The [Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/EmergencyManagement](http://Hillsboro-Oregon.gov/EmergencyManagement) webpage provides detailed information on how your family can start to prepare for a disaster, including how to create an emergency preparedness kit, and how to create a family preparedness plan.

### How to Create an Emergency Preparedness Kit

In a major event, such as an earthquake, emergency services may be delayed in reaching you. Having training and supplies on hand can help you until first responders can assist. Keep your supplies in an easy-to-carry emergency preparedness kit that you can use at home or take with you in case you must evacuate.

#### Basic supplies you should have:

- ✓ Water: one gallon per person, per day (three-day supply for evacuation and at least a two-week supply for home)
- ✓ Food: non-perishable, easy-to-prepare items (three-day supply for evacuation and at least a two-week supply for home)
- ✓ Flashlight
- ✓ First-aid kit
- ✓ Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible)
- ✓ Extra batteries
- ✓ Medications and medical items
- ✓ Multi-purpose tool
- ✓ Extra cash
- ✓ Copies of personal documents (medication list and medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies)
- ✓ Mobile phone with chargers
- ✓ Family and emergency contact information
- ✓ Sanitation and personal hygiene items
- ✓ Emergency blanket
- ✓ Map(s) of the area



#### Consider the needs of all family members and add supplies to your kit, such as:

- ✓ Medical supplies (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, etc.)
- ✓ Manual can opener
- ✓ Infant supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers)
- ✓ Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl)
- ✓ Extra set of car keys and house keys
- ✓ Games and activities for children
- ✓ Two-way radios

#### Other supplies you might include in your kit:

- ✓ Whistle
- ✓ N95 or surgical masks
- ✓ Matches
- ✓ Rain gear
- ✓ Towels
- ✓ Work gloves
- ✓ Tools/supplies for securing your home
- ✓ Extra clothing, hat and sturdy shoes
- ✓ Plastic sheeting
- ✓ Duct tape
- ✓ Scissors
- ✓ Household liquid bleach
- ✓ Entertainment items
- ✓ Blankets or sleeping bags

## Watch How to Prepare Your Home for an Earthquake

Do you know how to turn off your home's gas, water, and electricity in the event of an earthquake? ### How to Prepare: Before an Earthquake

- Repair defective electrical wiring, leaky gas lines and inflexible utility connections. Get appropriate professional help. Do not work with gas or electrical lines yourself.
- Bolt down and secure to the wall studs your water heater, refrigerator, furnace and gas appliances. If recommended by your gas company, have an automatic gas shut-off valve installed that is triggered by strong vibrations.
- Anchor overhead lighting fixtures.
- Be sure your home is firmly anchored to its foundation.
- Place large or heavy objects on lower shelves. Fasten shelves, mirrors and large picture frames to walls. Brace high and top-heavy objects.
- Store bottled foods, glass, china and other breakables on low shelves or in cabinets that fasten shut.
- Install flexible pipe fittings that are more resistant to breakage to avoid gas or water leaks.
- Locate safe spots in each room under a sturdy table or against an inside wall. Practice getting to them quickly.

### What to Do: During an Earthquake

- Duck, cover, and hold! Minimize your movements during an earthquake to a few steps to a nearby safe place. Stay indoors until the shaking has stopped and you are sure exiting is safe.
- A dangerous earthquake myth is that you should take shelter in a doorway. Doorways are no stronger than any other part of the house and put you at risk to be struck by the door or other objects. You are safer under a table.

### What to Do: After an Earthquake

- Be prepared for aftershocks.
- Open cabinets cautiously knowing objects can fall.
- Stay away from damaged areas.
- Be aware of possible tsunamis in coastal areas.
- Monitor NOAA Weather Radio All Hazards and commercial radio and TV for information and be ready to follow instructions instantly. The Specific Area Message Encoding (SAME) for Washington County is 041067.

### How the City of Hillsboro is Preparing for a Major Earthquake

The City of Hillsboro's website includes frequently asked questions (FAQs) that explain how City departments are working to prepare for the possibility of a major earthquake. - Will roadways be functional after an earthquake?





## Seven Safety Tips for Fall and Winter from the Hillsboro Fire Department


- Install working smoke alarms on every level of your home, test them monthly, and keep them clean and equipped with fresh batteries.
- Make sure your generator is in good working order, is correctly vented, and make sure you have extra fuel stored for the appliance.
- Verify your furnace is in good working order, and make sure space heaters (*pictured right*) are at least three feet away from anything combustible.
- Check that your fireplace's chimney is clean, and that a guard is in place to keep sparks in the fireplace and not on your furniture.
- Make a home escape plan and practice it with your family. Know when and how to call for help.
- Use caution with ladders. Ladder falls are a significant cause of accidental death and injury. Fall and winter are when people are



most likely to use ladders to clean gutters, fix leaky roofs, or hang holiday decorations.

- Keep walkways and driveways clear of leaves and anything that causes slipping. Likewise, prepare now for below-freezing days by keeping salt or sand on hand to control icy patches where you walk.



## Be Seen, Be Safe When Heading Outside This Winter

With darkness falling earlier in the evening, it's time to think about how visible you and your family are at night or during low-light hours. It's best to wear light-colored, reflective outerwear, reflective tape, and lights. Keep in mind that you are first visible to a driver from 500 feet away when you are wearing reflective clothing, compared to just 55 feet away when wearing dark colors. As our community partners at TriMet would say, if you go out at night, dress right.
