CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Small Businesses Play a Big Role in Our Prosperity

When life gets busy, it helps to take a break from the emails and phone calls to walk outside and recognize that from the Pacific Ocean to Mount Hood, and in between, we are rich with natural beauty, here in Oregon. Similarly, with our economy, it helps to look beyond the tree in front of us to recognize the forest's vastness.

From buying groceries to visiting a great restaurant to enjoying a Hops baseball game, every business transaction is connected. Consider this chain of events: a company earns a dollar by selling a product, then pays an employee a dollar for making the product, and then that employee spends the dollar at a local store. You can see how the cycle starts over and repeats. Because of Hillsboro's


economic diversity, our small businesses enjoy great opportunities to grow and provide good jobs for our residents.

The cluster of high-tech companies has earned a great deal of attention for Hillsboro. Having such a balanced support network helps our local businesses survive during economic downturns and thrive in growth periods. Not only does this economic diversity help our city, it helps our region and our state's economy, which previously relied almost exclusively on traditional forestry and agriculture. That is why we are continually recruiting and encouraging new and diverse companies to do business in Hillsboro.

The benefits of this business ecosystem then extend to other small businesses that provide valuable services, such as restaurants, retail stores, and health care providers. The economic ecosystem at play then provides essential resources for schools, roads, parks, libraries, public safety, and so much more. And in the process, our residents have an increasing number of jobs that provide opportunities for young adults just getting started in their career, and seasoned workers looking to advance.

For this to truly succeed, you need to have new dollars entering the economy. I often stop and think about how we are often just a transaction or two away from a dollar connected to Oregon's largest private employer. Our neighbors at Intel have created an ideal environment for smaller, emerging companies to thrive in. Their presence is one reason why Hillsboro is home to so many small businesses.

We've partnered with the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce to provide resources for our local businesses to succeed, including aspiring entrepreneurs who consult with experienced Chamber staff members on how to get their new businesses started. Our friends at the Chamber note that the website ReferenceUSA.com lists about 3,000 Hillsboro-based small businesses that employ fewer than 10 employees, while about 600 businesses employ between 10 and 50 workers.

Starting a business is a risk. Running a business is full of risk. We all should be thankful that our local entrepreneurs are willing to take that risk. Just as we have to remind ourselves sometimes to appreciate the natural beauty around us, let's take time to recognize the valuable role that our businesses, big and small, play in our community's quality of life, and let's root for their continued success.

DOLLARS AND SENSE: Ten Ways to Reduce Paper Use and Save Money

Thanks to paper-reducing efforts, the City of Hillsboro now uses less than 50 percent of the paper used in 2008, resulting in a cost savings of nearly \$11,000. You, too, can reduce your use of natural resources and save money. To help you get started, Hillsboro Sustainability Manager Peter Brandom offers the top 10 ways to reduce paper use at work:

- 10. **Change your default printing** to a copy machine, which is generally much more efficient.
- 9. **Set print jobs to default to duplex (two-sided) printing.** Printing on both sides saves money and paper.
- 8. **File email and other electronic communications electronically,** rather than printing.
- 7. **Eliminate “stranded” print jobs** by setting “mailboxes” for newer copier machines, which include the option to require the user to type in a code before printing.
- 6. **Print in color only when necessary,** as color toner and paper is generally more expensive.
- 5. **Encourage electronic document review,** rather than printing documents just to read them.

- 4. **When meeting with a group, clearly communicate your intentions for printing.** For example, “In an effort to reduce paper use, please note that hard copies of meeting materials will/will not be provided at the meeting.”
- 3. **Eliminate redundant printers and fax machines** that use more toner and electricity than copy machines and may not be able to print on both sides.
- 2. **Use a higher level of recycled-content paper.** This may not reduce costs, but using a minimum of 30 percent recycled-content paper helps save virgin paper and trees.
- 1. **Know what you are printing!** Signature blocks, quotes, and disclaimers can easily generate unneeded printed pages. Use “print preview” to save paper – and money!

A Tale of Two Water Supplies: Hillsboro and Portland

Knowing that your water is safe to drink is important to your family, which is why it’s also important to know where your water comes from. When you turn on the tap in Hillsboro, it’s reassuring to know that the Hillsboro Water Department’s water supply comes from the Joint Water Commission system that taps into the Coast Range.

In May, the Portland Water Bureau issued a Boil Water Notice that led many families in Hillsboro to wonder if our water was impacted as well. The answer was no. Portland’s water supply comes from the Bull Run watershed, which is completely separate from Hillsboro’s water supply.

Consider these other differences between the Hillsboro and Portland water systems:

- Hillsboro’s drinking water is filtered.
- Hillsboro’s drinking water is stored in covered reservoirs that protect water from outside contamination.
- Hillsboro’s drinking water is disinfected with free chlorine.

TV Highway Paving Project: Keep Businesses in Mind As Construction Continues

By the time construction on the TV Highway Paving Project through Downtown Hillsboro is complete, drivers will see rebuilt and newly-paved roads, along with upgraded utilities and significant cost savings thanks to efficient planning. But as construction continues this summer, you can help our community by keeping in mind that businesses on Oak and Baseline streets are open and ready to serve you.


Much work is already complete on the project, including the installation of new water lines, the replacement of many storm sewer lines, and improved sidewalks and pedestrian ramps in various places. But much work still remains to be done this summer, including rebuilding almost the entire stretch of Baseline Street from 10th Avenue to 1st Avenue, and Oak Street from 4th Avenue to 10th Avenue.

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Summer Safety: Mow Your Lawn Without Injury

Having a freshly-mowed lawn does not need to be dangerous to your health. In May, the Hillsboro Fire Department and Washington County Fire District 2 extinguished two separate lawn mower-related fires caused by the heat of the mower igniting combustible materials. Each year, about 60,000 people are treated in hospital emergency rooms for injuries from lawn tools – many are burns caused by careless use of lawn mowers.

Consider these suggestions from the Hillsboro Fire Department to help prevent your lawn mower – push or riding – from causing a fire or an injury:

- Make sure the engine does not get low on oil.
- Store and pour gasoline carefully, and keep it in an approved container with a tight-fitting lid.
- When refueling, wait for your machine to cool, wipe up spilled fuel immediately, and never fuel a running mower.
- Keep dirt and grass clear of the engine cooling fins. Your engine needs air circulation to prevent overheating, or it may lock up or catch on fire. The same rule applies to keeping grass and debris from clogging the mower deck.
- Let your mower cool off before storing it.
- Never place your hands or feet in the blade area of the mower while it's running.
- If the safety equipment doesn't work, don't operate your mower.
- Check your mower electrical cords for frayed or damaged spots. Frayed insulation added to a metal mower, along with damp or wet grass, can cause lethal shocks or severe electrical burns.
- Never leave a running mower unattended. 



Hillsboro Airport Update: Parallel Runway Project to Begin

This summer, Hillsboro residents will notice changes starting to occur at Hillsboro Airport (HIO) as the Port of Portland begins construction on the new parallel runway. The runway was identified in the 2003-2005 Hillsboro Airport Master Plan as a way to reduce congestion and delay, while also improving efficiency at the airport. The runway will allow for a separation between departing/arriving aircraft, and aircraft in the training patterns at HIO. The runway is not intended to bring commercial service to the airport or to significantly increase airport capacity.

During the construction period, there will be some temporary changes in the helicopter usage of the Charlie training pattern (the Charlie helicopter pattern is north of the airport, over the Evergreen Road area). This temporary change from normal operations will likely divert some traffic from the area north of the airport to the Alpha and Bravo helicopter training patterns (the Alpha and Bravo helicopter patterns are east and west of the airport, over Brookwood Parkway and the NE 25th Avenue areas, respectively).

The contractor on the partner-project between ODOT and the City of Hillsboro has made the area a summer focal point. As a result, if you are driving along Oak and Baseline streets this summer, you can expect to encounter lane closures – day and night – along with uneven road surfaces and construction noise.

You can help make the ongoing construction easier for all by slowing down and being patient when you encounter a short delay or disruption. And while you are in the area, consider patronizing those businesses that have been impacted by this project. The blue cones and “business access” signs positioned at each driveway can help guide you into their parking lots.

YAC Year in Review: 2013-2014

From volunteering at City of Hillsboro events to creating an anti-bullying campaign for students, Hillsboro's Youth Advisory Council (YAC) left a major impact on Hillsboro during a busy and productive 2013-14 season. Here are some of the year's highlights:

- YAC students spent much of the year working on the Anti-Bullying Initiative. Students attended information sessions and created a public service announcement (PSA) to encourage their peers to "rethink and redefine" their relationships. The PSA premiered at the Civic Center in May, and will reach local high schools this fall.
- Kicking off the holiday season, YAC members got involved in Holly Days by selling hot chocolate and cookies (donated by local businesses) in order to raise money to fund two \$200 Community Spirit Scholarships.



- On Global Youth Service Day, volunteers maintained trails and manned the native plant sale at Jackson Bottom Wetlands. YAC members were responsible for recruiting youth volunteers, who were rewarded


with food and beautiful weather!

- YAC members volunteered at HomePlate, a nonprofit organization with a weekly drop-in session that provides

a safe place for young people experiencing homelessness to find resources and enjoy a free meal. YAC members planned, prepared, and served two dinners.

- In April, Representative Suzanne Bonamici visited YAC to speak about education and her role in Congress.



- Six YAC members were selected to attend the 2014 National League of Cities Conference in Washington, DC. The conference marked the second year in which YAC students made the trip to the nation's capital.
- Drawing over 200 high school students from the Hillsboro area, YAC members helped organize the City of Hillsboro's Youth Invasion event to connect City professionals with students. High school students hoping to earn their required career credit were able to network with City of Hillsboro employees and explore prospective careers.
